Margaret and the Moon by Dean Robbins, illus. by Lucy Knisley (Knopf Books for Young Readers)

With more and more recognition being given to often forgotten linchpins of major historical

events, this charming picture book details the key role that computer programmer Margaret Hamilton had in perhaps the single largest cultural event of the past fifty years, the Apollo 11 Moon Landing. It shows how Hamilton's childhood curiosity into how things worked translated into her adulthood job of programming software for various NASA missions, including the Moon Landing. Complimented by Knisley's simple but warm illustrations, with an afterword detailing how Hamilton was honored by NASA, and what her life was after she left NASA, this is a timely, uplifting book about the importance of curiosity and how pursuit of interest can lead you to have unexpected influences on history.

### The Radium Girls by Kate Moore (Sourcebooks)

Kate Moore discovered the "radium girls" while directing a play in London by Melanie Marnich, These Shining Lives. The play was

based on true events, and as Moore researched the story of these lives, she realized that they had never been given the justice they deserved. Upon the discovery of radium, young women were hired to paint watch faces in radium factories, assured of not only the safety, but also the benefits of this new wonder. **The Radium Girls** is a compelling page turner that reads like a novel. The strength of these young women, as they literally fight for their lives in the early 1900s, is inspiring, and heart-breaking. ### Celebrate Pride at Books on the Square

June is Pride Month and Books on the Square is highlighting books by and about the LGBTQ+ community, both new releases and old favorites. Check out our Gender and Sexuality section, but for a few suggestions in the meantime:





**Tranny** is the intimate memoir that gives us a look at the life of Tom Gabel as founder of one of punk's most influential bands, Against Me! As the band's struggles with militant punks, fans, lawyers, and rioting turmoil were documented in public, Tom Gabel's struggle with identity was documented in the journal the rocker kept. In May of 2012, Tom Gabel came out as trans, now living as Laura Jane Grace.

**Dispatches from Lesbian America** was edited by Xequina Maria Berber and includes short stories and memoirs from Lesbian writers of all walks of life. Sometimes heartbreaking, sometimes funny, always beautiful.



**Love is Love** is the graphic collaboration to benefit the survivors of the Orlando Pulse Shooting. Dozens of artists and writers got together to create a beautiful act of protest. The range and depth of this so broad, it's impossible to summarize, but no matter which writer or artist you're looking at, it's stunning.



LGBTQ Stats, by David Deschamps and Bennett Singer, compiles statistics of all sorts. If you ever wondered what percentage of Americans were LGBTQ+ or sexuality organized by location or age, this is the book to check first. An excellent reference point for examining the shape and breadth of the queer community.






Friday, June 9 at 7pm Paul F. Caranci, **Wired** 

It was an explosive case of political corruption that rocked a small town, an entire state and drew headlines across the nation. Three sitting councilmen had been arrested and

accused of executing a scheme to extort bribes. And once the dust settled, as many as ten officials were caught up in a scandal that swirled around nearly everyone in the suburban New England town that some called, "the most corrupt town in America." Yet had it not been for one man who worked undercover with the FBI for seventeen months – a career politician with thirty years' experience railing against corruption – the scheme may never have been revealed. In Wired, the author shares his own harrowing personal account of how he gambled his thirty-year political career, his reputation, and his family's safety in his quest to restore good, honest government to a community that needed it most.

Paul Caranci is a native Rhode Islander who served on the North Providence Town Council for over 16 years. After stumbling upon a corruption ring that permeated the council, Caranci worked undercover for 17 months with the FBI to expose the plot and end the nefarious activity.

Kathleen Saville, **Rowing for My Life** 

Just out of college, newly wed, and set up with her husband Curt in a small town in New York, Kathleen Saville quickly realized that an ordinary life working for a better used car and a home with a mortgage would never satisfy

her thirst for freedom and adventure. The year before, she and Curt had retraced Henry David Thoreau's canoe journey through the Maine Woods, and both were veteran rowers. Inspired, she suggested that they row across the Atlantic Ocean. They set out from Morocco and, tested by adverse currents, gales, and their own inexperience, accomplished the near impossible. Three years later, while they attempted to row across the Pacific, Curt was washed overboard and lost their sextant—their only means of navigation. Cinematic, suspenseful, heartbreaking, and ultimately triumphant, her story of an unraveling marriage is also the account of finding her true self amid the life-and-death challenges at sea.

Kathleen Saville holds two Guinness world records, as the first woman to row across the North Atlantic and across two oceans. She teaches at the American University in Cairo, travels widely, publishes articles, and blogs about her adventures.
